Covid-19 Lateral Flow Home Test Kits

I am writing to clarify the current position on Covid-19 testing, especially the LFD self-test kits. Primary school pupils **will not** be asked to test in school at this time.

However, if you are a member of a household, childcare bubble of a pupil, student or staff of a school or college, you can get a twice-weekly test through:

- your employer if they offer testing to employees;
- at a local test site;
- by collecting a home test kit from a test site;
- by ordering a home test kit online.

Take a test at a rapid lateral flow test site.

You can take a rapid lateral flow test at a local site. Testing at these sites is assisted, which means you will swab yourself under the supervision of a trained operator. You may need to book an appointment. Find your nearest rapid lateral flow test site at <https://maps.test-and-trace.nhs.uk/>

Collect test kits.

You can collect 2 packs of home test kits at a local collection point. Each pack contains 7 tests. Anyone 18 or over can collect. Most collection points are open from 1.30pm to 7pm. You can check online if the location is open or busy before you go. You do not need to make an appointment. Do not visit a collection point outside opening hours, as it may be used to test people with coronavirus symptoms outside these times. Order home test kits online

If you cannot get tested at your workplace, or are unable to go to a test site or collect test kits, you can order a home test kit online. Do not order online if you can get a test through other methods. This frees up home delivery for those who need it most. Order rapid lateral flow home test kits at <https://www.gov.uk/order-coronavirus-rapid-lateral-flow-tests>

What twice-weekly testing involves

You will be asked to:

- take a test twice a week (every 3 or 4 days apart);
- report every result to NHS Test and Trace on the same day you take the test.

Report your test result online HERE at <https://www.gov.uk/report-covid19-result> or by calling 119.

If anyone tests positive or gets coronavirus symptoms, they should:

1. Self-isolate immediately;
2. Get a PCR test to confirm the result;
3. Follow the stay-at-home guidance for households with possible coronavirus infection;
4. **At this point**, you will need to inform the school office that a member of your household bubble has tested positive.

If your child has tested positive and attends Kingsland CE Primary School then we will contact our Local Public Health for further guidance on potential bubble closure. A negative result means the test did not find signs of coronavirus. But this does not guarantee you do not have coronavirus, so you should keep following all coronavirus advice including:

- regular handwashing
- social distancing
- wearing a face covering where recommended

I will continue to keep you updated as regards to any change in Covid-19 protocols and guidance via the school newsletter and website.

A reflection on **THANKFULNESS** by Wendy Priday, Foundation Governor, Eardisland Church

A Bible story that illustrates the value of **THANKFULNESS** is the story of the ten lepers: Luke, Chapter 17.

A leper is a person who has a disease called leprosy which causes sores all over their bodies. In Jesus' day this disease was very common – people who had this disease were thought to be unclean and were required to stay away from others because of the fear that they may be infected.


One day, Jesus was walking through a small village when he saw a group of ten lepers. They stood far away from Jesus and called to him, “Jesus, Master, have pity on us.” Obviously, they knew who Jesus was and that he had the power to heal them. When Jesus heard them, he called back to the lepers and said “Go, show yourselves to the priest.”

As the lepers went on their way to see the priest, they looked at their skin and the sores were gone! Jesus had healed their disease! They were so happy that they ran up and down the streets singing and dancing. Suddenly, one of them stopped and went back. Praising God with a loud voice, he threw himself at Jesus' feet and said “Thank you”. Jesus said to him, “Weren't there ten who were healed? Where are the other nine?” Only one out of ten remembered to say, “Thank you.”

Every one of us has so much for which to be thankful and don't you just hate it when someone does something nice for you and you are prompted with the words “Now what do you say?” We all know what to say, but unfortunately, we sometimes forget to say it - which is what happened in our Bible story.

Last year many of you sent cards and pictures to the Wye Valley NHS to say a very big “Thank you” to them for all their extra hard work during this pandemic – and then they wrote back to you with their heartfelt thanks saying how much they appreciated what you had done!

There is a very old saying “Count your blessings” and, indeed, it reminds us to celebrate and be truly thankful for everything, our families and friends and the acts of service in this amazing world that keep us all going each and every day.
