Have you heard the German national anthem being played at the World Cup recently? The melody was written by Joseph Haydn and used in his string quartet called The Emperor Quartet.

A string quartet is a Chamber ensemble. Chamber music is different to large-scale orchestral or choral music in that it is on a much smaller scale.

Many different composers wrote music for a string quartet, starting in about 1750 with Joseph Haydn, and including famous composers such as Mozart, Beethoven, Schubert and Shostakovich.

INSTRUMENTAL and LAMDA TUITION for 2026 – 2027

We are convinced that a child reaps enormous benefits socially, academically and emotionally through learning a musical instrument. Being a Lead Music School for Herefordshire, our school has an excellent musical reputation and we would like to offer this opportunity for your child to learn to play a musical instrument.

In the **autumn term** 2026 we are offering the opportunity to learn an instrument through the Accredited Teacher Scheme with Encore Enterprises - Herefordshire Music Service. Parents will be able to order tuition with an 'Accredited Teacher' and hire instruments from the music service at a reasonable cost. Under the Accredited Teacher Scheme, the teachers will invoice parents directly. Accredited Teachers have been subject to a robust recruitment process. They all have up-to-date police checks (DBS) and will be receiving regular lesson observations to ensure that the lessons are of the highest standard. The scheme has allowed for savings to be made and there is a recommended charge rate of **£12.50** per 20 minute individual lesson. This can vary depending on the instrument being taught. Lessons for groups or pairs can share the costs if appropriate. Parents will be informed of the contact details for the instrumental teachers together with a list of terms and conditions. It is imperative that they are informed directly if your child will not be in school for their lesson. The school office also provides the music teachers with upcoming events that could impact on music lessons but responsibility is with the parents for any absences or cancellations. We would particularly encourage your child to learn **an orchestral instrument** as this can lead to exciting opportunities in county bands and orchestras.

You will then receive communication from the Accredited Teacher with further information (along with an instrument hire form if appropriate.) **If your child is already having music lessons, the Accredited Teachers will assume that they are continuing unless they receive half a term's written notice to cease.**

LAMDA

After the success of the Herefordshire Performing Arts Festival, and the very encouraging comments from the adjudicators towards Kingsland children, there is the opportunity for children to take LAMDA exams commencing in the **Autumn term 2026**.

Founded in 1861, LAMDA (London Academy of Music & Dramatic Art) is one of the UK's oldest and most respected awarding bodies and is recognised by Ofqual. These exams and qualifications are recognised internationally.

LAMDA certificates are great to obtain for any student wishing to further their career in the performing arts or enhance their skills and gain extra qualifications through school.

LAMDA exams develop social, communication and interpersonal skills. They increase confidence and self-esteem, provide a broader vocabulary and enhanced memory and recall. Learners will develop their vocal, physical, and interpretive skills.

During the exam, learners will perform their practical pieces followed by a discussion with the examiner about the material, their characters, and their choices. Pieces and questions differ depending on the exam and grade being taken.

Exams begin at introductory level (stage 1, 2 and 3) and move into Grade 1 through to 8.

Exams can be taken in **poetry, public speaking, acting and musical theatre**. Students can express their interest in a certain area and the LAMDA teacher will decide which exam and grade would be best suited to each pupil.

As they progress through the grades over the years, and they reach their medals (grades 6, 7 and 8), they can gain UCAS points which they can use for colleges and universities.

Students receive a certificate along with a written report and mark: Pass (50%+) Merit (65%+) or Distinction (80+).

LAMDA requires dedication and practice at home to bridge the gap between sessions. Students can begin LAMDA from the age of around 6 years old. Teaching sessions will be held on a 1-1 or group basis once a week for 20 minutes during school hours, at a cost of approximately £10 per session (to be paid per half term) with a qualified coach. Payment would be made directly to the coach. This is similar to the organisational structure of instrumental music lessons.

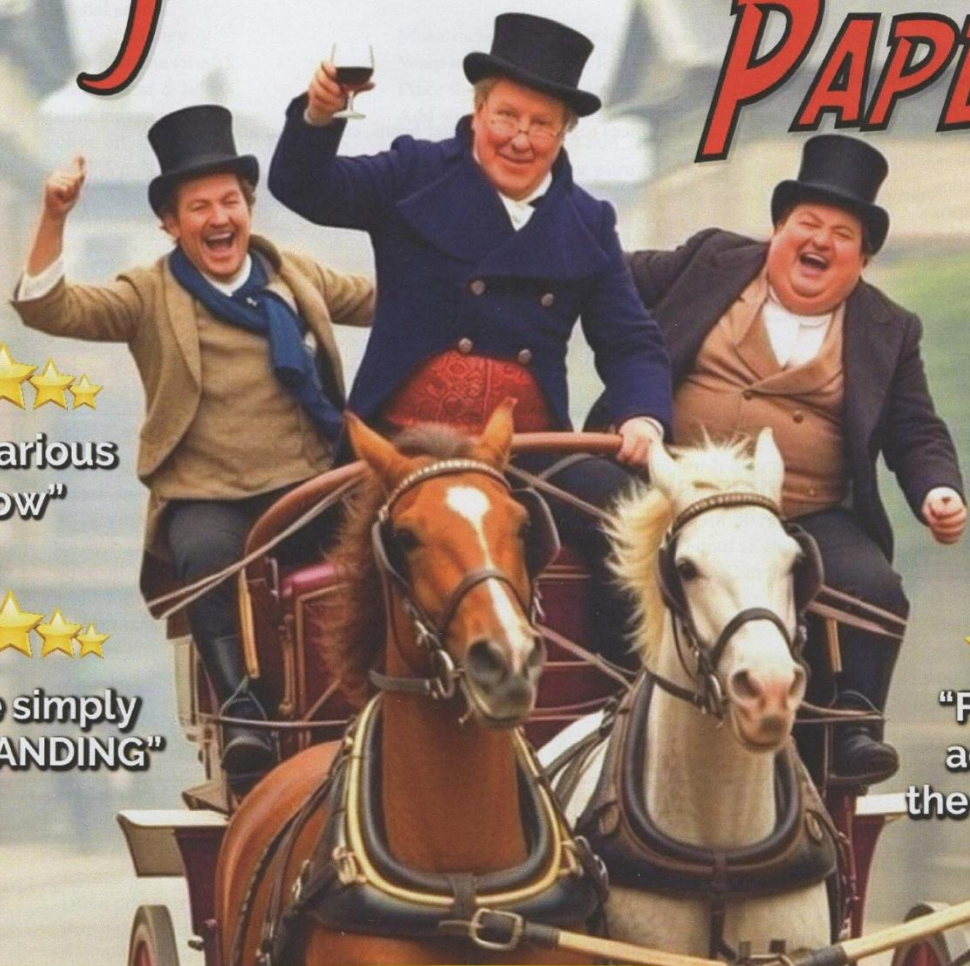

Should I keep my child off school?

Yes

Until...

Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode
Cold and Flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the national guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-19.
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started
Scabies	they've had their first treatment
Scarlet Fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics
Whooping Cough	48 hours after they started taking antibiotics

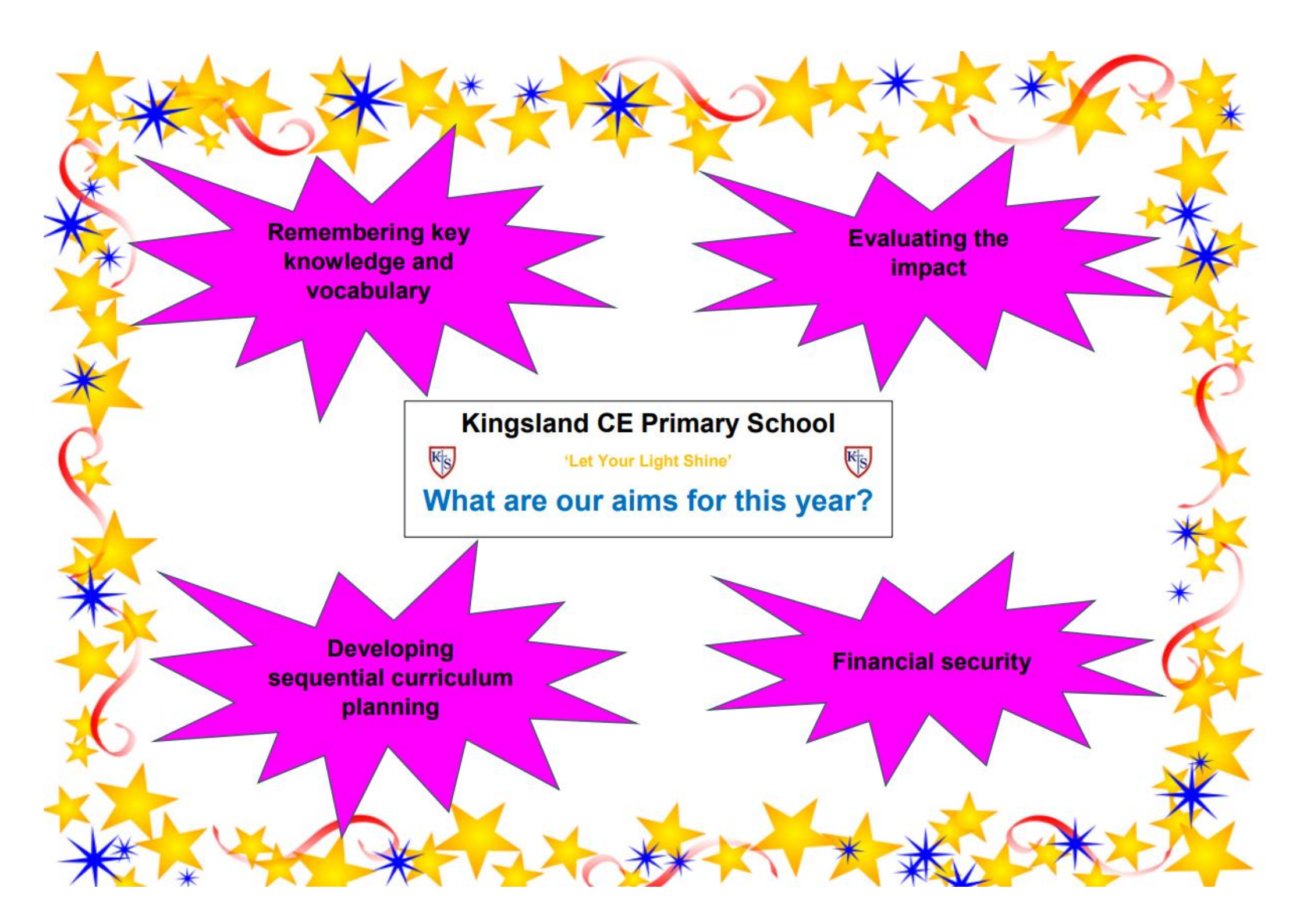

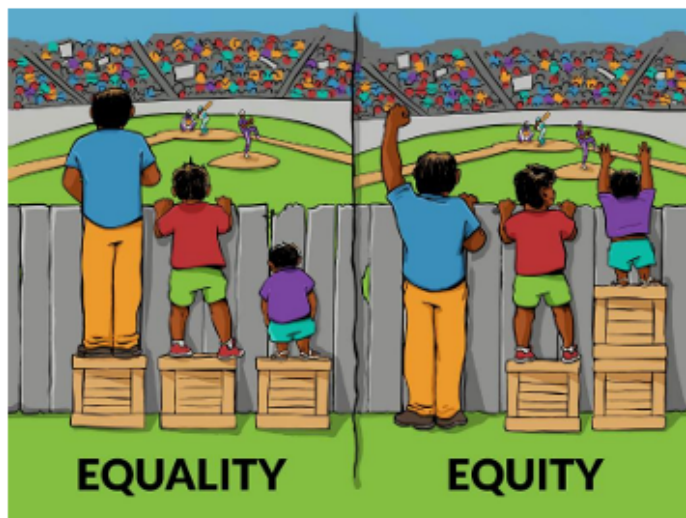

Christian Value Family Reflection

Welcome to our Christian Value Family Reflection which offers some suggestions, thoughts and ways into exploring and reflecting on the value of this half term: **EQUITY & EQUALITY**

A reflection on EQUITY & EQUALITY by Rev Maggie, Kingsland Church:

Have you ever found yourself saying, "It's not fair?!" "It's not fair, he's got more than me." "It's not fair, I want to do what she's doing." We live in a world that doesn't seem fair. Not everyone has the same. Sometimes, it is a good thing that we don't all have exactly the same. When we sit down for lunch, we don't all need the same sized portion. Someone else might have more or less food than you do, but hopefully, you have the right amount for you. This is **equity**, when we are treated fairly, but not exactly the same.

Sometimes, we do need the same – this is **equality**, when we are treated fairly and also equally. While we all need a different amount of food, we do all need to eat each day. We need equal access to the things that we need. **Equity** is about everyone being treated fairly and having enough for their needs. **Equality** is about being treated fairly and having equal access to what we need in the first place.

In the Bible, Jesus told a story to show what God's kingdom is like. He wanted to show that although some people are first to get what they need, it doesn't mean that the people who are last deserve any less. Jesus is generous towards everyone, not just to those who are first in line. Jesus said:

The kingdom of heaven is like a man who owned some land. One morning, he went out to hire people to work in his vineyard. In the morning, the man went to the marketplace and saw some people standing there, waiting to be hired for work. He said to them, 'If you go and work in my vineyard, I will pay you one silver coin each.' So, they went to work in the vineyard. The man went out again about midday and again in the afternoon. Both times he hired people to work in his vineyard. Near the end of the day, he went out and saw more people waiting to be given a job. The man said to them, 'You can go and work in my vineyard.' At the end of the day, the owner of the vineyard paid each of his workers one silver coin, enough for their needs.

When the workers who had been hired first saw that everyone had received the same, they complained to the owner. 'Those people were hired last and worked only one hour. But you paid them the same as you paid us. And we worked hard all day' But the man who owned the vineyard said to them, 'Friends, I am being fair to you. You agreed to work for one silver coin, which is what you need. Take your pay and go. I want to give the one who was hired last the same pay that I gave you.

How does this story make you feel? Do you think the workers were treated fairly? The workers needed their silver coin so that they could get what they needed to look after themselves and their families.

I wonder what needs we all share? Things like food, water, shelter, clothing, safety, security, love, belonging, friendship, respect, opportunities.

I wonder how we can treat everyone fairly, with equity and equality ... in our school? ... in our homes? ... in our neighbourhood? ... in our world?
