Complete at least one of these activities and send a photo to your teacher via teacher email-have fun, get creative, use your imagination and share your love of books with as many people (or pets, or teddies...) as you can!

Build a model of the setting of a favourite book

out of Lego, papier-mâché, or whatever you have at home or in the garden inside or out/ as large or as small as you want

It could be Miss Honey's home from Matilda, The Three Bear's Cottage, Hogwarts from Harry Potter...



Design a menu based on some of your favourite stories



Could it be 'Just Right Baby Bear Porridge' for breakfast?

May be a 'Butterbeer and Chocolate Frog' with lunch? Or will it be 'Owl Ice-cream with the Gruffalo' for dessert?

How about some of George's Marvellous Medicine to wash it all down with?

Have fun creating a menu for book lovers to choose from, complete with pictures and delicious descriptions! Can we tempt you?

Do some book-inspired cooking or baking

Owl ice-cream anyone?



Letterbox cookies for The Jolly Postman to cheer him up on his rounds?

How about making a picnic that the Famous Five would have taken on one of their adventures? Don't forget lashings of lemonade (or was it ginger beer?)

Draw a picture of your favourite character

Then label it with as many things as you can: round glasses, lightning shaped scar, long black cloak, stripy tie...



KS2: Can you use your labels to write a character description? It could be used as mini quiz in your class:

Who am I? I wear round glasses taped together with Sellotape. My straight black, messy hair covers a unique scar on my forehead in the shape of a lightning bolt...

Make a puppet

Or maybe lots of puppets! Can you create some characters from your favourite stories?

Maybe the Smartest Giant in Town made out of a wooden spoon?

Or a Quidditch Team made out of lollipop sticks?

Or maybe Mr and Mrs Twit would make amusing as sock puppets?

The choice is yours.

Once you have made them, why not put on a show?



Design a new front cover

What would you have on the front of David Walliams' 'Gangsta Granny'?

Would your version of 'A Squash and a Squeeze' include a picture of all of the animals squashed inside the house?

Would you have more realistic style pictures on the front of Jacqueline Wilson's 'The Suitcase Kid'?

What might Paddington be doing on the front cover of your Paddington story book?



Don't forget the title and author. KS2- you could add your own blurb on the back.

Make a bookmark

Design a really special one to use every time you read. Include the book title and author on it.

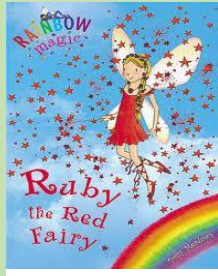
Maybe it could look like the broom from 'Room on the broom', full of passengers.

Perhaps it could be full of your favourite Rainbow Fairies, ready to fly through the pages of your next book with you.

Or Flat Stanley would fit perfectly nestled within the pages of your favourite book!

Watch out if you choose Horrid Henry- he might get into mischief while you are away!

Write a letter to your favourite character

Do you want to ask Percy the Park



Keeper if you can help him look after the animals when it snows?

How about

learning some magic from Hermione Granger?

Perhaps you would like to know whether the tiger came to tea ever again.

Would you like to know just how many storeys the treehouse could possibly cope with?

Why not tell Moon face that you would love to visit the Land of Topsy Turvey with him!

Don't forget the date and to put it in an envelope... I wonder what address you might write on it!

Make a map of where your story is set

Can you include all of the places as you imagine them on your map?

Where do the snail and the whale go on their adventures?

I wonder what a map of the inside of Willy Wonka's chocolate factory would look like?

Perhaps you can draw the route that the big bad wolf took when he visited all of the pigs.

Where did Kester's travels on the back of the stag take him in 'The Last Wild'?

Don't forget to label the important places and a title and key.

You could even make your map out of natural objects outside.



Above all- have lots of book-related fun on World Book Day.
